














Conservation Policy & Advocacy Priorities

Protect our Region's Forests, Mountains, Waters, and Recreational Experiences


- Land Water Conservation Fund Permanent reauthorization March 2019

Strategic Priority Landscapes



The 7 Principles

- 1. Plan ahead and prepare.
- 2. Travel and camp on durable surfaces.
 - 3. Dispose of waste properly.
 - 4. Leave what you find.
- 5. Minimize campfire impacts (be careful with fire).
 - 6. Respect wildlife.
 - 7. Be considerate of other visitors.

- 1. Start with Small Talk
- 2. Give an Objective Statement
- 3. Implications of Action: The Why
 - 4. How to Improve the Situation





Authority of the Resource Technique Tips for changing behavior while creating a positive learning experience

- Assumes behavior is UNAVOIDABLE, UNINFORMED, UNSKILLED, OR CARELESS.
- Attitude is important: be positive and confident
- Do not use judgmental terms
- Use body language to your advantage: stand shoulder to shoulder





Authority of the Resource Technique Tips for changing behavior while creating a positive learning experience

- Focus on needs of the resource
- Use personal mode
- May not see behavior change
- Does not always work





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
